From the Director, Jessica Keyser

Happy New Year! For many of us, the New Year is a time to reflect and set intentions for the months ahead. No matter what your resolutions and plans for the New Year may be, the Library has resources to support you. Perhaps you are planning to take a long-delayed trip to a distant location: learn a new language with Mango. Maybe you'd like to get in touch with your creative side: book an appointment in the DREAM Lab. Want to make new friends? Join a GPPL book discussion group! The possibilities are nearly endless.

In December, long-time Woods Branch Manager Pat McClary retired. Pat joined the GPPL as a Youth Services Librarian in 2005. In 2016, Pat received the prestigious Frances H. Pletz Award from the Michigan Library Association in honor of her dedication to serving youth in the community. Pat established the Study, Tutoring, Enrichment and Programs (STEP) program in partnership with Parcells Middle School. Pat has played an instrumental role in the GPPL leadership team in setting and achieving ambitious strategic plan goals and a full renovation of the Woods branch. We wish "Miss Pat" a long and healthy retirement. Emerging Technologies Librarian Jessie Schenk has stepped into the Branch Manager role at Woods. She is already doing a fantastic job. Be sure to introduce yourself to her the next time you're at Woods.

On Friday, September 9, we opened the newly renovated Woods branch. If you weren't able to join us, make plans to visit this extraordinary space soon, and be sure to take advantage of all the programs, projects and services the library provides throughout the year.

At the writing of this letter, we have just reached an exciting milestone in the construction of the addition at the Central library: the structural steel beams are now in place! I am happy to report that the project is on schedule and on budget, and we are on track to re-open in the Fall of 2023. The renovated and expanded building will include additional space for youth services and programming, expanded and accessible restrooms, a drive-up service window, and improved safety and accessibility throughout the building. We are grateful to the community, the Friends of the Library, the Library Foundation, and the Library Board for your support in maintaining and enhancing the building, ensuring that it will be enjoyed for generations to come.

Seeds available include:

- 3 kinds of ornamental and environmentally-friendly grasses
- 22 different herbs,
- 30 varieties of flowers
- 30+ different vegetables

New herbs include Cinnamon Basil, Thyme, Catmint, Anise and Greek Oregano. We've also added the New Yorker variety of tomatoes, Black Beauty eggplant and Florence fennel. Our wildflower varieties are native to our area and are hardy and drought-tolerant once established. They also provide wonderful food and habitat for pollinators and help to create a friendly yard for wildlife. Please check out the entire list of available seeds on our website beginning March 1.
