## Adopt-A-Stream with the Clinton River Watershed Council

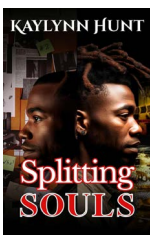

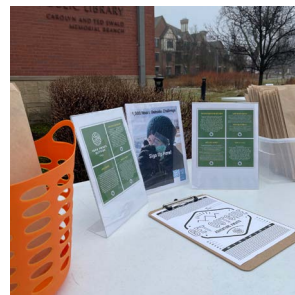
## Sensory Story Time

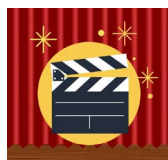

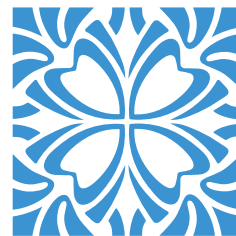
