Millage Renewal on November 3, 2026

On November 3, 2026, voters will have the opportunity to consider the renewal of the library's operating millage. The proposal would renew the library's current 0.6432 mill levy for 15 years. This millage is an essential part of the library's annual funding. It provides approximately 30% of the library's annual revenue, helping make it possible for the library to provide the services, programs, collections, technology and resources our community relies on throughout the year.

What does renewing the millage mean?

A renewal means continuing the existing millage that supports library operations. The proposed renewal is 0.6432 mills for 15 years. It is not a request to increase the library's millage rate. Because approximately 30% of the library's annual revenue comes from this source, maintaining the millage is important to the library's ability to plan responsibly and continue providing services to the community.

What does your library provide?

Every day, the library serves as a place to learn, connect, explore, and access resources. Library services include:

- Books, e-books, audiobooks and other materials
- Public computers, Wi-Fi and technology access
- Programs and activities for children, teens, adults and families
- Educational and cultural opportunities
- Resources for job seekers, students and lifelong learners
- Three welcoming buildings open seven days a week during the school year

The library also provides these services while working to be a responsible steward of public funds.

Why is this important?

Library funding is a partnership between the library and the community it serves. The millage provides a dependable source of revenue that helps the library maintain its current level of service and plan for the future. The millage will be used for all library operations, including staff, books, technology, building maintenance and improvements, and to pay off the bonds that were levied to execute the Library Reimagined building improvements completed in 2024. Just as homeowners must continually maintain their homes, the library board must be good stewards of the three buildings in our care. Some larger capital improvements in the near term include the replacement of the air conditioning at Ewald and

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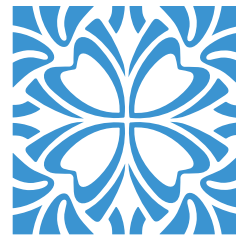
Woods, replacement of the boilers at Ewald, and modernizing the elevator at Woods to meet the current safety codes.

The Library adopted a five-year strategic plan in 2026 that is based on resident feedback on what matters most to them. You told us you wanted shorter wait lists on the most popular materials in print and electronic formats, more digital resources, to maintain our current hours, expand makerspace offerings, increased outreach to inform the community of our services, and more opportunities to connect the community in civil discourse. The successful execution of the plan depends on a renewal of the supplemental millage. The plan can be found on the library's website.

On November 3, 2026, please take the time to learn about the library millage renewal and make your voice heard at the polls.

French History of Detroit, 1701-1840

Author Charles G. Bird discusses his book, *The Straits of Detroit* and *Cadillac's Detroit and The French Era of Detroit*. Unlike any other American city, Detroit was created for the specific purpose of making French citizens out of Native Americans. It was designed to be a multicultural location and a trading post-fort community where Indians from different tribes would assimilate into French culture. The Great Peace of Montreal set the stage for Cadillac to encourage diverse tribes to come to le détroit where the French would ensure peace and tranquility.
